


Fill the Moolah Tube For **Heifer International**

News from our Librarian ~ Karen Clark

A couple of months ago I wrote about the book *Tattoos On The Heart* by Gregory Boyle, the Jesuit priest who shares what working with gang members in Los Angeles has taught him about faith, compassion



and the enduring power of kinship. That book introduced us to Homeboy Industries, the largest gang-intervention program in the world. This month I want to tell you about his book *Barking To The Choir*, which offers a snapshot into the challenges and joys of life on the margins. You can read stories of boys arrested at age nine, a gang member by twelve, jailed as a teen, and now working with the substance abuse team at Homeboy, helping others find sobriety. There are stories of children abandoned by parents eventually extending forgiveness to parents who are mentally ill. There are stories upon stories of former gang members which reveal how bright life can be when filled with unconditional love and kindness. These books are easy reads with powerful insights and are great books to start out the new year with a fresh perspective on how God works in our lives when we are open to seeing the goodness in each other. I dare you to check it out!


Adult-2 Class

Consumed
By the Fire of a Star
Hearing and celebrating
the story of the visit
of the magi:
Matthew 2:1-12

Zoroastrianism is a religion, active yet today, which served as the state religion of the pre-Islamic *Iranian empires*, from around 600 BCE to 650 CE. The three "wise men," or magi were likely Zoroastrian astronomers. They believed their god had charge of the stars until one day, their god was consumed by the fire of a star. Such a belief helps explain their inclusion in Jesus' birth story in the book of Matthew.

The word <u>magi</u> describes followers of Zoroastrianism. The three magi, or wise men, being consumed by study of the stars, noted an exceptionally bright star. Their traveling, in an attempt to learn what that star's sign might reveal, led them to Jerusalem.



Making a "courtesy call" on King Herod in Jerusalem, the magi met and made inquiries: Where is this newborn, who is the King of the Jews? When we were far away in the East we saw His star, and we have followed its glisten and gleam all this way to worship Him.

Herod then referred to all of the leading Jewish teachers,- chief priests, and head scribes. He was told of the reference in Micah 5:2 in which **Bethlehem** would produce a ruler. After questioning the magi, Herod sent them on their way.

The star continued leading them to Bethlehem and the structure in which Jesus and His family abided. As soon as the wise men arrived, they saw Him with His mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped Him.

The wise men later had a dream warning them not to go back to Herod (as he had requested). *The wise men heeded the dream* and returned to their homes in the East by a different route.


