Financial Update

2018 Mission offerings in Review

Our 2018 Rainbow Covenant mission report was recently completed Because we

started 2018 with 298 St Luke members, our giving goal was: 1)Apportionments paid in full; 2) \$3576 in second mile giving (this is divided into categories like international, national, state, hunger & poverty, umcor, etc); and 3) \$894 in third mile giving (missionaries and local giving). So our total goal after our apportionments = \$4470.

So, you may be asking "how did we do?" 1) We paid 100% of our 2018 apportionments. 2) We gave \$9744.36 toward 2nd mile giving and we gave \$3329.10 toward third mile giving. And those numbers do not include volunteer hours to Midwest Mission Distribution Center, Days for Girls, Mobility Worldwide, Trinity 5th Monday Suppers and any other volunteer hours people gave. What this shows is that St Luke is a giving congregation. Wahoo! Great Job! God Bless.




Lenten Study beginning in March

This year's Lenten study will be *Entering The Passion of Jesus: A Beginner's Guide to Holy Week* by Amy-Jill Levine. It explores the biblical texts surrounding the Passion story.

Jesus' final days were full of risk. Every move he made was filled with anticipation, danger, and the potential for great loss or great reward.

Jesus risked his reputation when he entered Jerusalem in a victory parade. He risked his life when he dared to teach in the Temple. His followers risked everything when they left behind their homes, or anointed him with costly perfume. We take risks as we read and re-read these stories, finding new meanings and new challenges.



There will be 2 or 3 groups meeting for the Lenten study. Be sure to find a group to join starting the week after Ash Wednesday and meeting until Easter. Sign-up sheets are on the Servant's Counter.



Later this month, hundreds of United Methodists from around the world will gather as our elected representatives to converse, debate, listen to the Holy Spirit, and make decisions regarding the United Methodist rules applying to LBGTQi persons. This General Conference was specially called for this specific purpose.

This special General Conference will take place in St. Louis, Missouri on February 23-26. Information regarding the General Conference and updates between now and then can be found at www.iaumc.org/gc2019.

What can you do?

Pray. Our prayers are important in the work of the Spirit. At Annual Conference, it was suggested that we pray from 2:23-2:26 each day, representing the dates of the gathering.

Pay attention. The General Conference will be live-streamed. You can watch our Church decide its future. The first 2 days will be dominated by prayer and worship. The legislation should begin on day 3. However, I believe that looking at daily briefings will be more effective than watching a live-stream.

Know. While our future may be unclear as a denomination, we know that St. Luke will still have vital ministry to do in Newton and beyond. God is calling us to be agents in the world, and to continue to be faithful followers of God.



February is the longest month. I know that by calendar days, it is always the shortest month. But with the cold, wind, snow, and dark-



ness, it is the longest month of the year for me.

Perhaps it is because there isn't much to look forward to. Football is over at the beginning of the month. Basketball doesn't get exciting for me until the madness of March. My bike is hanging in the garage.

But even in the midst of the dreariness of February, God shows us that there is reason to hope. On those days

that the sun comes out, I am reminded that the winter, as long as it is, will turn to spring very soon. Even with the snow on the ground, I see rabbit tracks and smile with the evidence of life enduring.



Soon spring will come. Just knowing that it will come sparks hope that is stronger than winter.

The same can be said of the kingdom of God. It has been a long time since Jesus ascended into heaven with the promise to return. We have been in a winter for a long time. But Jesus promised to return. That promise is as sure as the calendar. As the days tick on toward March, we know that spring is coming. As the days tick on toward March, we know that the day that Jesus comes again is getting closer, even if we can't see when yet. On top of that, we can see the tracks in the snow: the tracks left behind by the work that God is doing in the world. When we see the goodness of people who are helping in developing nations, we see God's tracks. When we participate in disaster relief around the world, we see God's

tracks. When we see folks in our own church reaching out to those who are suffering, we see God's tracks.

February may be a long month, and I may be thankful when it is finally over, but I also know that living through it is important. Likewise, as we live in waiting for Jesus to come again, I know that our living through this time is important. We still have things to do to prepare for Jesus' return. Do them.

The 2nd through 5th Sundays of the month through April, our Sunday school offering will go toward meeting our covenant with Larry and



My Story

The firetruck hurried past my home early one morning. An hour later, as I drove to work, I could see and smell the smoke. Lots of thick black smoke rolled out from a

downtown business in Grinnell. When I got to work, the fire was all that people could talk about. We learned that the fire was located in a restaurant in the middle of the street. Whenever anyone learned something new, the word spread throughout the room. We worried about the remainder of the downtown area. We worried about

the fire fighters from 6 area fire departments, some of whom are our coworkers. We wondered about the cause and many of us prayed for the restaurant owners, firefighters, downtown residents and the other downtown businesses.



Just as talk of the fire in downtown Grinnell spread quickly at work, word of the "antics" and "message" of John the Baptist spread quickly throughout Judea, drawing people to the Jordan River. Some came to see the spectacle and find out what it was all about. Some came to question who he was and who sent him.

John 1: 22-23 Finally they said, "Who are you? Give us an answer to take back to those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?" John replied in the words of Isaiah the prophet, "I am the voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way for the Lord."

Others came to be baptized and learn from him. John challenged them to repent and turn away from their sins. He told them how to live changed lives and to prepare for the coming of one who was greater than himself.

Excerpts from Luke 3:10-18 // "Anyone who has two shirts should share with the one who has none, and anyone who has food should do the same" // Tax collectors: "Don't collect any more than you are required to," // Soldiers: "Don't extort money and don't accuse people falsely—be content with your pay." // And with many other words John exhorted the people and proclaimed the good news to them.

Being Surprised Turning Blessings Upside Down: Luke 6:17-26

At the beginning of Luke 6, verses 1-11, we saw Jesus confronting the verbal challenges of His knowledge and authority in the Gallilean temples. Soon thereafter the twelve emissaries, or apostles, were chosen. They, along with the rest of His followers, traveled to a level plain at the base of a mountainous area. They were joined by a great crowd of people from across a wide region, coming to hear Jesus, be healed of diseases, and freed from demonic spirits.

It was a struggle for everyone to get near, as they wished to touch Him and be healed and feel the *power* emanating from Him. In what would later come to be known as the *Sermon on the Plain* Jesus addressed what it meant to be "blessed," turning the usual definition upside down.

People do not usually consider themselves feeling blessed if they see themselves as poor, hungry, sad, hated, insulted, or excluded. Such a situation creates a heart-wrenching feeling of sep-

aration from the rest of society. And likewise, those whom we deem as gifted, or more "blessed" than us, are people with whom we may feel a disconnect. This is the stuff of social classes, social circles, and a barrier to sharing gifts with each other.



Jesus' message that day gave hope to those who were down-trodden. The listeners were told that for as much as they were feeling separation and sadness, they would be aptly rewarded in heaven: When these things happen, rejoice! Jump for joy! Then you have a great reward in heaven. For at that moment, you are experiencing what the ancient prophets did when they were similarly treated by the ancestors of your detractors.


RECYCLING CHRISTMAS LIGHTS



Weather Cancellation Policy


