
Pancake Supper & Worship Service Ash Wednesday, March 1


Sunday, March 5 is the First Sunday of Lent.

Dear St Luke Family,

One morning three old cowboys came to see student pastor Bill Cotton to ask a favor. Their friend had died. They told him that old Jim didn't go to church but if he had, he would have leaned toward the Methodists.

Bill went to see his Old Testament professor for help because this old cowboy had broken at least twelve of the Ten Commandments and everyone in town knew it. Dr. Powers asked the young preacher, "Well, did they ask you to be his judge or to preach his funeral?"

Author and theologian Walter Brueggemann speaks of two ways to read any text. We can read it as if we are looking out the window. There we see a lot going on and it is easy to pass judgment—because we see only from our own perspective.




Brueggemann recommends that we look at the text as



if we are looking in the mirror. When we look in the mirror first thing in the morning, it is not pretty—and it is up close and personal. The mirror approach is to see one's self in the story.

For example, think of the text about that terrible moment when Jesus announces that "one of you who breaks bread with me will betray me." From a window approach, one feels safe knowing who he means. But the mirror approach places one's self at that table, not knowing with certainty.

We can smell the fresh bread and the aroma of wine, & see we are all in this together as we voice the "Is it I?"

The body makes itself grow in that it builds itself up with love as each one does its part. Ephesians 4:15-16

Rather than putting others on trial, it is better to first put ourselves in the story. Always, run a text by the mirror before you put it into use.

From now on, brothers and sisters, if anything is excellent and if anything is admirable, focus your thoughts on these things: all that is true, all that is holy, all that is just, all that is pure, all that is lovely, and all that is worthy of praise. Phil 4:8

I will always pray for you and ask for your prayers for me.







Glimpses of Grace


Risking transforming encounters with Jesus John 3:1-17

The Pharisees, along with the Sadducees comprised the ruling class of Israel. The Sadducees tended to be wealthy, held powerful positions, and seemed to be more concerned with politics, than religion. The Pharisees were mostly middle-class business people and were more in contact with the common person. Pharisees were more concerned with religion, than politics. They believed in strict adherence to oral laws and traditions.

Nicodemus was a Pharisee who came to visit Jesus "under the cloak of darkness." (Is this because he believed more about Jesus than he wanted others to know, OR because he wanted to have a quiet conversation?) Nicodemus began by telling Jesus that some

of them "had been talking." And that Jesus was "obviously a teacher who had come from God." -And that the proof was because of the "signs" Jesus had been doing. (miracles)

Jesus responded by stating that the only way for a person to come into the kingdom of God was by being born anew from above. Nicodemus' literal mind questioned, "How can a man be born when he is old?" (A physical -rather than a spiritual rebirth, as Jesus



Nicodemus and Jesus were both "teachers," yet they did not share common ground. Jesus was descended "from above," and Nicodemus had not yet been born "from above." This may have been the reason Nicodemus struggled with understanding Jesus. Yet, Nicodemus was mentioned **two** more times in John: defending Jesus before the Council, 7:50, and bringing ointments to anoint Jesus's body, 19:39.

January MMDC Mission Trip Report

A group of us traveled to Midwest Mission Distribution Center in late January. There were six St. Luke Members and three members of Prairie City United Methodist Church. We took nearly a pick-up truck load of donations from the two churches, seven sewing machines, a box of school bags, all the layette kits made in December, 60 flannel diapers, 40 baby kimonos, and seven covered with love quilts. While there we assembled 573 personal dignity kits (similar to UMCOR health kits), 102 birthing kits, and 216 flood buckets. This work included preparing some of the items for kit building.

Two of our members rolled 7,002 Handi-Wipes into bundles of 18 in preparation for the flood bucket building. The two men in our group spent their time working in the wood shop where they

built eight school desks from reclaimed wooden gym bleachers. The sewing machines will be refurbished and sent somewhere in the world where someone will be taught

to sew items which will provide support for a family.

Nothing stays on the shelf long at MMDC. This is a distribution center, not a warehouse. The goal is to get items to where they help someone. The networking used is nothing short of a miracle. We heard stories of military ships transporting goods free of charge and soldiers setting things up once it has arrived. We heard stories of an Order of Franciscan Sisters in the Kansas City area sharing used medical equipment and also distributing school desks and other supplies.

We heard stories of a non-profit in Florida shipping goods from MMDC free of charge to the Caribbean nations. We have seen a Wal-Mart truck headed to North Carolina, free of charge, loaded with goods from the center. There are new stories of networking every time we go.

There is another group going to MMDC March 5-8. We will be taking the 130 school bags we made in February with fabric we brought from the center in January. We can also take more sewing machines with us. If you have access to new or used sewing machines of any vintage that you are willing to part with, we can take them with us.
