



Lesson On Lent

In her blog, Leading From the Heart, Bishop Laurie Haller shared a lesson on Lent that helps us to better understand why we observe the season of Lent.



The English word "Lent" comes from the Anglo-Saxon lencten, which refers to the lengthening of days that accompanies spring. In the early church, Lent was a time when converts were instructed in the Christian faith in preparation for baptism, but it was also a time of fasting and penitence for all believers. That's why many of us "give up" something for Lent...like chocolate.

The beginning of repentance is always the transformation of our heart. Most changes of heart, however, are gradual, even imperceptible. We wake up one day and suddenly realize that we are not the same person we were last year, last month, or even last week. But we're not sure how and when it happened.

This change of heart is God's work as much as it is our own. It's called grace. God loves you so much that God is just waiting to give you a new heart through Jesus Christ, even when you haven't earned it or don't deserve it. Is your heart restless? Is there a sense of disquiet in your inward being? Are you disconnected with the source of your life? The good news is that you, too, can have a changed heart. All you have to do is say "yes".

I am not a big basketball fan, but the NCAA tournament is different. I don't pay attention to any team other than the Hawks until March hits, and then, I get invested in teams many have never heard of.

The first time I participated in an office bracket, I said, Gonzaga? Who's that. Well, they were no joke. They may have been the underdog and they may have been called Cinderella, but they proved that they deserved to be there.

In basketball, you have to earn your way in. There isn't anyone that lets you in the tournament unless you've proven yourself. And still, when the underdog wins, it seems like a miracle happens. It makes for great television.

The story of the people of God is the story of the underdog. God looked at the Hebrews in Egypt and decided that those people were God's people. The word Hebrew is the equivalent of our riffraff. These were the people that nobody cared about, that nobody had ever heard of. They were the slaves. And God chose these people to be the chosen people. They didn't earn their spot with God. God chose them.

When Jesus engaged people in ministry, it was quite often those on the edge. They were the underdogs of society: the tax-collectors, the prostitutes, the sick, the beggars. In every case, they didn't deserve to be there, but Jesus accepted them anyway.

March Madness and the Cinderella story that happens each year reminds me that even when we don't think that

we deserve to be in the presence of God, God chooses us. We often feel like the Hebrews, or the lepers, or the beggars. We feel like we have no chance. God reminds us with the story of Easter that we are chosen for redemption.

We don't deserve to be in, but God chooses us anyway.

Root for the underdog.

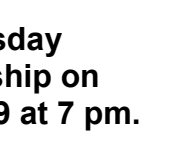

WARM WELCOME FLANNEL FUND
March 11, 2018

In February, 7 St Luke members traveled to Chatham, Illinois to work at Midwest Mission Distribution Center (MMDC). On our last day there, several members of our group worked on making flannel diapers for layette kits.

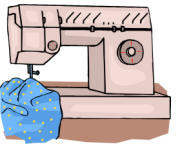
As a group we decided to make this a St Luke project. Each layette kit includes 6 diapers and we estimate we could make 6 diapers for around \$10. So, on Sunday, March 11th we will be taking an offering during worship. The funds collected will be used toward the purchase of flannel for these diapers. We have set a goal of \$250...can we surpass that? If you would prefer to donate flannel for this project we ask that you donate a minimum of 3 yards of flannel. This flannel can be brought to the church on Sunday March 11 as part of the offering. Please be sure to avoid any flannel with paw, hand or foot prints.



Then, on March 14 and 15, there will be a sewing day at the church (see separate article) to create these diapers. (As you can see, there are lots of ways to be a part of this project.) The diapers will be delivered to MMDC in May by Joyce Stonehocker who now serves on the MMDC board.

Sewing Days

We will be sewing flannel diapers for layette kits in Fellowship Hall March 14 & 15. We can use help no matter what your skill set. Bring your sewing machine and your serger along with basic sewing supplies and thread. We can use people to cut fabric and press seams along with those who sew. These diapers will be taken to Midwest Mission Distribution Center in May. We will



start at 9 am and sew until about 4 pm. At noon, we will break for a potluck type lunch. This is always a fun event with lots of fellowship while we work, so come join on one or both days, or even part of a day if you can. Sign-up on the Servant's Table, please, so we can have enough tables in place.

Love Arriving Exploring the stories of Holy Week: Mark 14:1-15:47

A perfume jar, a palm branch, a loaf of bread and glass of wine, a garden, a rooster, a cross, and some linen cloth. All these items are central to the stories of Holy Week.

In Bethany a woman came with an *alabaster* jar of very expensive perfume, broke it, and poured that perfume on Jesus' head. Jesus said, "She will be remembered forever for what she has done." The day that Jesus and his friends left Bethany and arrived in Jerusalem the whole city treated him like a king: *Blessed is the one who comes in the name of God!*

That evening it was the time of the celebration of the **Passover Seder**. During the meal with his disciples in the prepared room Jesus took a loaf of bread and cup of wine for the first *communion*, also sharing, "One of you will betray me."

Jesus and his disciples went to the garden where Jesus and His disciples customarily visited, Gethsemane, located at the foot of the Mount of Olives, a mountain range. *The Mount of Olives has been used as a cemetery for over 3,000 years.* It was there that the disciple Judas betrayed Jesus, identifying him to the authorities.

Later that night Jesus was taken to be questioned by the "high priest." Peter tagged along, just far enough from Jesus to not be clearly identified as one of *Jesus' followers*. Three times Peter was singled out and accused of "being with Him." Three times Peter denied the accusation; then the rooster crowed twice.



From the chief priests, Jesus was sent to Pilate, the Roman governor. Jesus was crucified, the day became dark for three hours, and the temple curtain was torn from top to bottom.

Joseph of Arimathea, a prominent Council member, asked for Jesus' body and provided some linen cloth for wrapping.

The Seasons of the Spirit Bible Study Class meets Sunday mornings at 9:15 to read about and discuss issues related to each week's prescribed lectionary readings. Come join in the learning every Sunday morning - - after the 8 o'clock service, or before the 10:30 service!

Mission Trip Update

Thank you for praying for our group of 13 who recently traveled to Midwest Mission Distribution Center south of Springfield, IL. During our 2-1/2 days of working we assembled 312 Cleaning Kits. Each kit is a 5 gallon plastic bucket filled with cleaning supplies. Much prep leads up to filling the buckets. For example, garbage bags are rolled into bundles of 12 and each bucket has two of those bundles. There were 7,488 big black garbage bags in our buckets and we rolled more bags in preparation for the next group. We rolled well over 5,000 Handi-wipes into bundles of 18 for the buckets.



Our group and a few local volunteers assembled 809 Personal Dignity Kits. These kits contain personal hygiene items wrapped in a washcloth and towel then sealed in a ziplock bag. Three from our group worked faithfully on school desks which are made from used gym bleacher wood. Medical supplies were counted and the table and chairs were cleaned for the new board room. We also learned to sew flannel baby diapers and brought back patterns so we can make these here at St. Luke. Although some of these jobs may seem a bit menial, it is surprising the satisfaction and even the fun that is experienced when doing these jobs for God's Kingdom.

We have many stories we could tell. Feel free to ask any of us for more details. Those on this trip were Corinne Kleppe, Carolyn Cook, Joyce Stonehocker, Barb and Mike Kaldenberg, Dave Miller, Pastor Chad Jennings, Karen Clark, and five from other churches. Future dates reserved for St. Luke to be at MMDC are January 20-23, 2019, February 24-27, 2019, January 19-22, 2020 and February 23-26, 2020.
