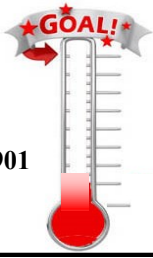

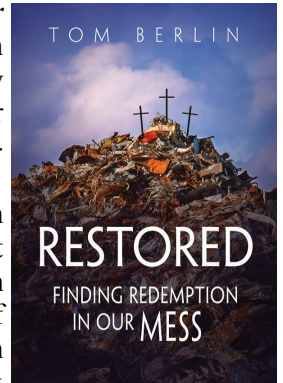

## Lenten Study beginning in March

This Lenten season there will be an opportunity to join a small group study. *Restored: Finding Redemption in our Mess* encourages us to reflect and mediate through our own brokenness, showing us that it is only when we focus on the cross as a place to surrender control that we can leave our mess and find redemption. There will be 2 group meetings for the Lenten study. One group will meet on Sunday mornings at 9:15 am at the church. The other group will meet on Mondays at 6:30 pm rotating between the homes of Jenni Patty and Karen Clark. The study will begin on March 1st or 2nd and will continue for six weeks. The sign-up sheet to attend is on the Servant's Counter.



## Lent / Easter Offering

Earthquakes, fires, hurricanes, floods and tornados, they happen every year, and in every part of our world. "When a natural or a human-cause disaster strikes within the United States, UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) works with local Annual Conference disaster response ministries to provide financial and physical support. Outside of the United States UMCOR serves as the primary channel for United Methodist assistance. In the short term, UMCOR provides financial assistance and in the long term, UMCOR works with local partners toward recovery and reconstruction. Together, we are rebuilding hope in the lives of those in need all over the world." (Excerpt from the UMCOR website)

As the NOW committee discussed this years Lent/Easter Offering we found ourselves focused on the Earthquakes in Puerto Rico and the Fires in Australia. That led us to the UMCOR Disaster Response funds, which we have named the 2020 Lent /Easter offering recipients. We will split the funds received between National Disaster Response - which will include Puerto Rico, and the International Disaster Response. (at this time there was not a fund for Australia but that may change)

The response to the Earthquakes in Puerto Rico include addressing urgent needs, providing shelter, distributing supplies, and conducting assessments and outreach. International responses can include funds to distribute food, hygiene supplies, shelter and other basic needs to ease human suffering. In the long term, the response includes working with local partners toward recovery and reconstruction. We can join hands with other United Methodists in this effort by giving to St Luke's 2020 Lent/ Easter offering for UMCOR Disaster Response. Welcome to Lent. Lent means different things to different people. If you grew up Catholic, or in a Catholic community,



then you were used to seeing dark smudges on foreheads on Ash Wednesday; you were used to seeing people eat fish on Friday at school or at the big fish fry in town. If you didn't have a Catholic church in your town, then maybe you missed these things. In my hometown of Carlisle, it was common for the kids in my class to talk about what they were giving up for Lent. Most of the kids tried to give up homework or cleaning their rooms but settled on candy or pop when their parents said no to the first.

As a United Methodist, we didn't do the things that the Catholics did during Lent. We didn't do Ash Wednesday. We didn't give up things for Lent. We didn't forbid meat on Friday. I suspect that we didn't do these things because we were still lingering in a time in our country when Catholics and Protestants didn't get along, which means we didn't do anything that looked too "catholic." (That's not a good reason to do or not do something.)

While we still don't officially observe the practice of giving something up for Lent, it is observed by many in the United Methodist Church. Many give something up to



remind them of the sacrifice that Christ made on the cross. Others observe Lent by taking on some-

thing new. They either add something to their devotion time, or they set reminders on their phone to pray throughout the day, or join a Lenten study group. These things are designed to help us pay more attention to God and to the things that God is asking of us now.

As I approach the season of Lent this year, I have been reflecting on those who are pushed to the edges of our society. Whether it is the political rhetoric or the preparation I'm doing for General Conference, my heart is aching for those that are afraid to speak. My heart aches for the family that can't afford medicine. My heart aches for the family that lives in fear of death and seeks a safer place to live, only to be turned away. My heart aches for people who have to hide a significant piece of who they are because if they don't, their families will reject them. My heart aches a lot.

That last one is on my mind the most in this moment. I have been going to the Governor's Conference on LGBTQ youth since moving to Newton and finding out

that the high school Gay/Straight Alliance (GSA) has been going without a school sponsor because the school wouldn't let the teacher go unless she took a personal day. I didn't know what to expect the first time I tagged along, but I certainly didn't expect to see 1500 kids smiling, laughing, and having a great time. That might seem unusual, since these young people were missing a day of school for a conference, but I've been to many youth events over the years, and at every event there are at least a third of the youth that don't want to be there. Their parents made them come. Their teachers made them come. They'd rather be anywhere else but at the conference. And I had to ask myself why I didn't see a single person that looked that way.

And so I listened. I listened to these young people talk about how this was one place where they didn't have to hide. This is one place where they didn't have to worry about being bullied because they don't fit the mold that society forces them to fit in. This is one place where they can reveal their true selves without fear, without shame, without feeling like they weren't people of value. Don't we all want that?

I have been reflecting on this because I know of some students that want to go to this conference and experience that freedom, but they can't afford it. One young person doesn't live at home anymore because they aren't accepted. One has been told that they can't have money for that. My heart aches for them to have this one day of freedom and to experience what it means to be a child of God that has value. My Lenten sacrifice is to make sure they can have this.

Will you join me? If this makes your heart ache, will you join me? It really won't take much. \$350 is something that I can cover myself without much sacrifice. But this is bigger than the money. This is about the lives of young people. This is about a day of wholeness that just might help them turn a corner for their whole lives. I don't want to hoard that for myself. I want to share this joy, and burden, with the people I call family.



Join me in this by giving a little to St. Luke designated to GSA conference.

We once didn't do anything that looked too catholic. We left that behind us. I hope that one day we leave this behind us, too, and that everyone will be able to feel like the child of God they are. Until then, my heart will ache.

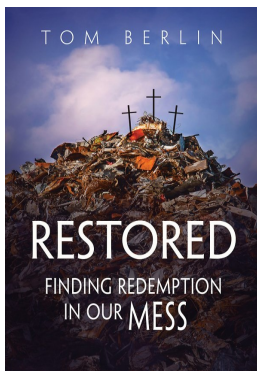

## Faith is more important than fear.

JOHN 3:1-17

God's promise to bless the people of God so **they** may be a blessing to all of creation.

The **Pharisees** and **Sadducees** comprised the ruling class of Jews in Israel. Religiously, the Sadducees were more conservative in one doctrinal area: they insisted on a *literal* interpretation of the text of Scripture; the Pharisees, on the other hand, gave oral tradition equal authority to the written Word of God. The Pharisees believed in an afterlife and in an appropriate reward and punishment for individuals, but the Sadducees denied the afterlife, holding that the soul perished at death. The Sadducees rejected the idea of an unseen, spiritual world, but the Pharisees taught the existence of angels and demons in a spiritual realm.

Nicodemus was a Pharisee, a person with some influence among his people. Under the "cloak of darkness" he came to visit with Jesus, hoping to question Him. Did he believe more about Jesus than he wanted others to know?

In their conversation Nicodemus acknowledged that Jesus was a teacher who "came from God." Jesus shared with him that *only someone who experiences birth for a second time can hope to see the kingdom of God*. The concept of a "second birth" as a grown man seemed to confuse Nicodemus, as he stated its impossibility. Jesus elaborated: *Even you, an educated and respected man among your people, must be reborn by the Spirit to enter the kingdom of God.*



"...you do not comprehend the necessity of life **in the spirit**? I tell you the truth: we speak about the things we know, and we give evidence about the things we have seen, and you choose to reject the truth of our witness. If you do not believe when I talk to you about ordinary earthly realities, then heavenly realities will certainly elude you."

What would you ask, if you had a private audience with Jesus?

The Seasons of the Spirit Bible Study Class meets Sunday mornings, sandwiched between the end of the 8 a.m. church service and the beginning of the 10:30 service. The class's emphasis is on the weekly lectionary readings. **All** are welcome to join in the discovery and learning!

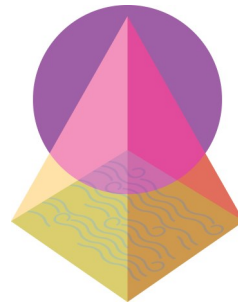
