a metal peg through the holes and lift up the stack of cards. With each question more and more cards would drop out. After the last question, the cards you had remaining were supposed to help you figure out





Inspiration by role models whose discipleship is compassionate


When Peter was in Lydda, an inland city, about a 10 hour walk northwest of Jerusalem, he received an urgent message to come to Joppa "as soon as possible." Joppa was a 5 hour walk from Lydda (using today's roads). It was the residence of Tabitha, or <u>Dorcas</u> in Greek, a good woman-- devotedly doing good and giving to the poor. By the time Peter heard of Tabitha's situation she had died of her sickness.

Tabitha's fellow disciples had washed her body and placed her in an upstairs room. When Peter arrived at Tabitha's home he immediately entered the room where she lay. In that room were the many friends of Tabitha, crying and mourning the loss of their dear beloved. All showed the various items of clothing that Tabitha had made for them.


The mourners cleared the room upon Peter's re-

quest. Peter kneeled and prayed for a while, then turned to Tabitha's body: *Tabitha, get up!*





# Executive Summary of the Congregational Assessment Tool (CAT) Results for Newton, St Luke United Methodist Church Written by Michaela Craigmile

St Luke United Methodist Church recently completed the Congregational Assessment Tool (CAT). The church had a response rate of 65 people, representing 100% of your average attendance. This gives us confidence that the results discussed here are representative of the entire congregation. We presented an indepth interpretation of the results to church leaders on April 7<sup>th</sup>. This summary attempts to share the main insights of the results.

#### **Church Vitality: Energy and Satisfaction**

Holy Cow Consulting, the company that produces the CAT, advises that it makes it possible for leaders to "make better decisions in less time with greater confidence." The CAT gives clarity about where you are as a church so that you can take more informed next steps. As part of the interpretation, we compare your church's responses to around 2,500 other churches that have taken the CAT in the last 6 years. This allows us to characterize and categorize your church. The goal of any church is to be a vital part of the lives of the congregation and the community. Extensive research has shown that high vitality churches look very different in many ways but share high scores in the CAT measurements of satisfaction, energy, and flexibility.

St Luke UMC scored very high in satisfaction and flexibility and high in energy. These scores put your church in a category that is well positioned to grow and bring more people into a relationship with Jesus but can suffer from becoming complacent.

#### **Your Unique Church: Drivers**

The CAT measures the primary areas of focus and the highest areas of expectations for your congregation. These drivers characterize the long-standing DNA of your church or current points of conflict. While answering questions about satisfaction and energy, people in your church focused on the following areas, indicating that when these requirements are being met, your church thrives.

- Persons who serve as leaders in our church are representative of the membership
- The worship services at our church are exceptional in both quality and spiritual content
- When conversing with a person, our Pastor listens for feelings, as well as words and treats feelings as important
- In preaching, our Pastor engages people with a message that enriches their lives in the world
- Our Pastor helps us accomplish our mission by bringing out the best in everyone
- There is not frequently a small group of members that oppose what the majority want to do
- Our church does a good job supporting persons in ministry by reminding them that they are making a difference
- The leaders of our church show a genuine concern to know what people are thinking when decisions need to be made

You might notice some patterns in these drivers. Many of them center around leaders and your pastor, which can lead to a lot of pressure on them, but when their leadership is strong, your church will likely be a high vitality church.

#### **Theological Perspective**

The Theological Perspective Index is a measure of how members of the congregation relate to the nature of Scripture and the church's role in society. More conservative congregations have members that believe the Bible is the literal Word of God in matters of faith, history, geography, and other secular issues and that converting people to Christ is the first step in creating a better society. More progressive churches are less likely to be committed to the historic faith and believe that Christian education can have several purposes. This is not a measure of politics and may not coincide with views on today's social issues. Your responses indicate that you are average in theological diversity and more conservative than about 55% of churches. Theological perspective is not closely related to the measurements of satisfaction, energy, and flexibility and is not an indication of good or bad. Congregations across the spectrum can be successful and have high vitality.

#### **Priorities and Social Justice**

The CAT asked members where they would like additional energy placed. The responses were then analyzed, and the priorities were ranked. Like 98% of churches surveyed, St Luke UMC's top two priorities were to make changes to attract families and reach new people. These are important but difficult to execute goals, and it is often easier and more fruitful to start by investing in the third priority. The third priority, which is unique to you, is to expand outreach ministries that provide direct services to those living on the margins of society. Other top priorities also indicate a desire to expand outreach opportunities for healing and community revitalization as well as create opportunities to connect and work on social change. Of the social issues included in the survey, poverty issues were the top choice, with 82% of people believing your church should be advocating for them, followed by environmental causes, immigration issues, and LGBTQ rights, all at around 65%.

#### **Strengths and Weaknesses**

St Luke UMC showed many strengths in the CAT. You scored higher than at least 89% of churches in 6 of the 8 indices the CAT measures, including scores above 95% of churches in hospitality, conflict management, governance, and morale. It is important to acknowledge and celebrate your strengths as you have discussions about your next steps. Two places with room for improvement are spiritual vitality and worship and music.

#### **Next Steps: Further Conversations**

At the April 7<sup>th</sup> interpretation, church leaders and interpreters discussed these ideas in more detail, but in general, we would consider St Luke United Methodist Church as a high vitality church, well positioned to take next steps to grow in a way that makes sense for you. As you work to understand these results and decide where to move forward as a church, it is important for the congregation and leaders to be in conversation with each other about how to grow and strengthen current ministries while investing in future ministries. Immediate conversations should cover worship and music, spiritual vitality, and potential outreach ministries.

On a final note, with any assessment or time of self-learning, it is easy to be critical of yourself and others. Instead, we encourage you to adopt a posture of curiosity—listening to God, each other, and yourself. This is an opportunity for discernment, discovery, and growth. This is an opportunity to transform St Luke United Methodist Church into an even better version of itself.


