Thanks to your prayerful giving, we have paid our building loan for the remodeling and portico off early! Way to go, St Lukers!

However, our church building is more than 50 years old and needing some work to keep it in good shape for many years to come. The Trustees have been taking a good look at our building and taking note of things that need attention. Number 1 on the list is the roof.

As you know, many roofs in Newton took a beating from a hail storm last June. The church and parsonage took a beating too and there are plans to replace them this summer. The insurance payment covers part of the replacement but not all. Also, the Sanctuary roof has no insulation in it and while the roof is being repaired would be the ideal opportunity to insulate it to help with our heating and cooling costs down the line.

Over the years, the people of St Luke have shown how much they care about their church home. We can all be a part of keeping our church in good condition. We will need to keep our donations to the building fund coming in to pay for the upkeep of our church home.





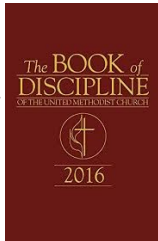
It's Going to be a Tough Year.

This is going to be a tough year for the United Methodist Church. Since the last General Conference in 2016, the United Methodist Church has been waiting. We have been waiting for the report from a special commission that was tasked with finding a way for us to break the stalemate that has existed since the early 1970s on the issue of homosexuality in the church. The Commission on a Way Forward will soon release its report to the Church in preparation for a special General Conference to be held in February of 2019 that will decide how the Church will proceed.

It going to be a tough year. The United Methodist Church has been dealing with this issue almost since its beginning. The UMC formed in 1968, when the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Evangelical United Brethren merged. It wasn't in that first General Conference, but in the next one, that this issue was raised. In the decades since, the issue keeps being raised and the answer remains largely the same: gay Christians who wish to be United Methodists are welcomed...to a point. Our Book of Discipline, which is our book of rules that we live by, states that all persons are of sacred worth. (UM Book of Discipline 2016, p.26) It also states in our social principles that the UMC does not condone the practice of homosexuality. (UM BOD 2016, p. 113) And in the provision of membership in the local church, the BOD states that *All people may attend its worship services, participate in its programs, receive the sacraments and become members in any local church in the connection.* (UM BOD 2016, p. 155) The matter is complicated by two other prohibitions, 1) that pastors shall not conduct homosexual marriages or unions, and 2) pastors may not be self-avowed and practicing homosexuals.

This has been a complicated issue since the beginning. The faithful Christians that believe that homosexuality is a sin believe so because of their reading of the Bible in which it is prohibited. They believe that God said this is wrong and if God wanted to change God's mind, we would have a scripture that explicitly said that. The faithful Christians that believe that homosexuality is not a sin believe so because of their reading of the Bible which shows that Jesus embraced all people, even those who the world labelled sinners. The woman at the well was called a sinner and Jesus accepted her. The tax collector was labelled a sinner and Jesus accepted him.

Notice that I called both sides faithful. They both believe they are acting faithfully in their beliefs. They both have historical and biblical source material to back them up. And in recent years, they have had a difficult time talking, hearing, and living with the other. This is what has led to this tough year.



We don't know what the outcome will be. There are those who believe that the prohibitions will remain. There are those that believe that a local option will become available. In other words, each Annual Conference, or each local church, will be allowed to decide if they will be open to LGBTQ pastors and marriages in their church. There are those who are hoping that a new openness will prevail. We don't know what the outcome will be.

It has been my practice to focus on other issues. I believe that we have plenty to do in the world. We have people who need to know Christ. People in our community need to know the love of God through us. There are hungry people who need food. There are homeless people that need shelter. We have enough work to do.

However, this is an issue that we cannot ignore. The United Methodist Church will be in increasing conflict over the next year, and maybe in the years to come. Every one of us needs to engage in this issue, and to join the conversation about this. Where do we stand as individuals? Where do we stand as a church? Where should we stand as a denomination? Where should we stand as the people of God?



Other denominations have faced this. We are not alone. The Presbyterian Church, USA and the Episcopal Church of the United States have been in the news in recent years about this issue. These denominations have opened themselves to the ordination of LGBTQ pastors. They have also experienced fractures because of it. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is going through this process now.

And we are in deep conflict with ourselves. The last election of bishops included the election of Bishop Karen Oliveto, an openly gay pastor. There have been several trials of pastors that have declared their homosexuality to their congregations. It has been a tough few years in anticipation of the Commission on a Way Forward's report.

I write this article as an invitation. I invite you to join the conversation about this. No matter which side of the faithful you find yourself, I welcome conversation about this. If you need help seeing the other side as faithful, I can help. But this must be a conversation. It cannot be one-sided. It cannot be me preaching my understanding at you all. It cannot be me claiming to know more than you because I have a religious degree. I am one of the faithful, no more. We are a family that may or may not agree, but we are a family.



Over the next year, I want us to be engaged in the conversation. It will largely be shaped by your needs. If you want individual conversation, my door is always open. If you want small group discussions, make your desire known. When enough people want to come together, we will. But we cannot ignore this. We may be asked

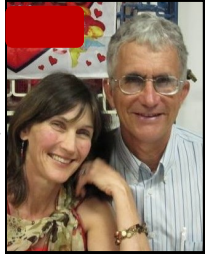


**Sunday School Mission Offering

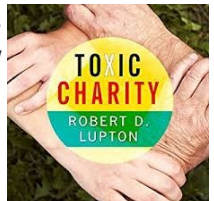

A team of Iowa State Students descended on the Habitat for Humanity home on the East side of Des Moines. Our job for the day was basically to do some demo and to clean.

Some of our group began cleaning in the bathroom and kitchen. The rooms had an overwhelming smell and a greasy grime coating every surface. The rest of us were given supplies like soapy water and scrapers... our job... remove the old wallpaper from a couple of the rooms in the house. What we didn't know as we began the job was that there were FIVE layers of wall paper. It was faded, grimy, sometimes sticky and frankly it appeared to be never ending. With each layer, we discovered a new layer of paper. Our team worked hard for several hours, then took a break for lunch at a nearby fast food restaurant.



When we returned to the home after lunch, for our next round of work, the difference was immediately evident. As we walked through the door to the home, you could smell the difference in the air. And, the home seemed brighter than it had in the morning. There was still a lot of work to do to remove the dirt of the past and reveal a fresh surface. But we could already see and feel a difference.

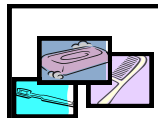
That is what Jesus does in our lives. He comes in and cleans out all of the grime, the stink and the layers of our sin. He creates a cleaner, healthier "home" for our souls which allows the love of God to shine from us. Many times we still have some work to do, but when we let Jesus in we can see evidence in our lives of the fresh surface.

Pentecost Sunday

Celebrating the Gift of the Holy Spirit:
Acts 2:1-21

The **Feast of Weeks** (Shavuot) is a Jewish holiday occurring sometime between May 14 and June 15. It commemorates the anniversary of God giving the Torah to the nation of Israel assembled on Mount Sinai; it also marks the wheat harvest. Its date is directly linked to 50 days after Passover. Followers of Jesus were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks, thanking God for the harvest. Christians today celebrate the Feast of Weeks (Christians now call it **Pentecost**) 50 days after Easter. Pentecost is now called the "birthday of the church."

Christ's disciples and followers, men and women, at least 120, were gathered in the Upper Room - - the room of the Last Supper. Without warning the whole structure reverberated with the roaring sound of a violent wind. A flame appeared with offshoots of smaller flames spreading to everyone present. All were filled with the Holy Spirit and began speaking languages they had never before spoken. Jesus had promised his disciples that he would send the Holy Spirit after He was gone (John 16:7). They, of course, did not know *when* that would occur. But the Holy Spirit did appear on the 50th day after Easter!



Other Jews present in Jerusalem heard the noise, and consequently the Christian group speaking in multiple native languages. At first those who had received the Holy Spirit were questioned why and how they could speak the languages of the multiple ethnic groups present in Jerusalem. To this Peter shouted, explaining that this was the fulfillment of the prophecy. The *Spirit* had been offered to His servants. *"Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them about three thousand souls."*

The Seasons of the Spirit Bible Study Class meets Sunday mornings at 9:15 to read about and discuss issues related to each week's prescribed lectionary readings. Come join in the learning every Sunday morning - - after the 8 o'clock service, or before the 10:30 service!

Below are the lectionary scriptures that the Sunday school class participants will be learning about each week in May. Even if you cannot come to class, consider taking the time to read them at home!
