Jacob's party will be held on Sunday, May 26 from 5-8 pm at St Luke UMC.



Golden Cross Sunday Offering May 26

Golden Cross Offerings are used to celebrate health and welfare ministries and the roll in spiritual well-being within the annual conference. 100% of the offering is retained by the Iowa Annual Conference to fund grants to local churches and community groups.





Last week, a ripple was sent around the globe. While the General Conference made some big decisions back in February, the Judicial Council review of those decisions show us the new landscape of the United Methodist Church.

Some will say nothing has changed. Others will say that everything has changed. Both are right.

In February, the General Conference voted to approve the Traditional Plan. This plan kept the prohibitions against same-sex weddings being conducted in United Methodist churches or by United Methodist pastors. It also put forth some penalties for those who engage in this anyway. These included a mandatory one-year suspension without pay for a first offense and a rescinding of credentials for a second.

It also seemed to reaffirm that those wanting to be clergy could not be a "self-avowed practicing homosexual." But, by mistake or by design, the word "practicing" was left out of the legislation. Before the legislation passed, those clergy who were gay but celibate could still serve the church. Now, it seems that even identifying as gay will bar those called by God.

In addition to these changes, there were a few additional safeguards included in the Traditional Plan. These included a certification by the bishop of each Annual Conference that the Board of Ordained Ministry, which is responsible for examining potential clergy and credentialing them, is only made up of people who promise in writing to uphold the Discipline of the United Methodist Church in its entirety. Bishops who don't abide by this, or who don't follow through with complaints brought against clergy may be sanctioned by the College of Bishops.

The Judicial reviewed 11 petitions for their constitutionality. 7 of them were deemed unconstitutional. The four that remained are: 1) the mandatory sentence of a one-year suspension for clergy who perform same-sex marriages, provided that they are found guilty at a church trial. 2) Boards of Ordained Ministry shall not recommend clergy they know to be gay for ordination. Bishops shall not



Commission or Ordain those they know to be gay. 3) If a clergy person, or potential clergy person, publicly declares themselves to gay, that is proof that they are violating the Discipline. This declaration may be in the form of a marriage, a civil union, a domestic partnership, a social media post, or any other public declaration. 4) Bishops are still accountable to the other bishops in their Jurisdiction, called the Jurisdictional College of Bishops.

In addition to this, a petition was passed at the General Conference that made a provision for churches to leave the denomination with their property and liabilities. Currently, all church property is held in trust by the local church but is the property of the United Methodist Church. This means that if three conditions are met, individual congregations may choose to disaffiliate with the United Methodist Church and affiliate with another denomination or become an independent entity. Those three conditions are 1) a two-thirds majority vote by all the members present at a called Church Conference to disaffiliate, 2) meeting the conditions set by the Annual Conference for disaffiliation (which at General Conference was that the church has paid in full the last 12 months of apportionments, plus the next 12 months of apportionments, plus any pension obligations that are determined), and 3) a simple majority vote by the Annual Conference for disaffiliation.

There have been several responses to this decision. In a pastoral letter by our resident bishop, Bishop Laurie Haller, she states, The decisions of the 2019 General Conference have been perceived by many as appropriate. Others, however, see the decisions as excessively punitive, sending a clear message to the world that The United Methodist Church does not welcome all and is perpetuating injustice. This is especially concerning because many young adults today in the United States, especially, have grown up in a culture where diversity is mandated in schools and the workplace and intolerance against the LGBTQIA+ community is not accepted. They will not attend a church that excludes others from full participation.

At the same time, The United Methodist Church acknowledges that all persons are of sacred worth. The 2016 Book of Discipline says (¶4. Article IV. Inclusiveness of the Church), "All persons without regard to race, color, national origin, status, or economic condition, shall be eligible to attend its worship services, participate in its programs, receive the sacraments, upon baptism be admitted as baptized members,



and upon taking vows declaring the Christian faith, become professing members in any local church in the connection."

My heart aches for our beloved denomination right now because I dream of a fully inclusive church. I dream of a deeply Wesleyan and evangelical church that is welcoming of all, is focused on mission and outreach, and offers a place at the table for everyone.

This last weekend, at First United Methodist church of Omaha, Nebraska, the Confirmation Class decided not to be confirmed into membership. In a letter they wrote to the congregation, they stated that they were "disappointed about

the direction the United Methodist denomination is heading" and will wait for the response of the congregation before being confirmed. What a display of courage.

These changes go into effect on January 1, 2020. In May 2020, General Conference will meet again. I am sure that these issues will come up in some form at that General Conference. The special GC was meant to decide this issue so we could move past it, but with a vote of 438 to 384, and some questions around voter fraud, the decision cannot be called definitive.

Still, what the world has heard is that regardless of the nuances placed on the decisions, the United Methodist Church is anti-gay. This has hurt us. It has hurt those who are gay far more. Several statements have been made since this decision that say that all people are God's children and all are welcome in United Methodist Churches, but that rings hollow. You are welcome, but only in certain areas. You may not get married here. You may not be a pastor here.

My heart is crying. My heart is broken. My heart is struggling with this.

And yet, there is still work to be done. The Church still has a mission to fulfill. So, for the time being, that's what we need to remember. That's where we need to put our focus.

There is still pain in the world that Jesus wants to

heal. There is still hunger in the world that Jesus wants to feed. There is still hopelessness in the world that Jesus wants to overcome. There is still bondage that Jesus wants to free. We are the ones that need to do this.



So, we will still meet next week. And the week after that. We will still worship a God that is bigger than legislation. We will still welcome all of God's children. All of them. And we will still love everyone that we come into contact with. That is our calling. That is essential to our identity as Christians.

As for the future...God is still writing that. We will encounter that together. And we will talk about that on the journey.

Thank you for your commitment to Christ and to St. Luke UMC.

song... They touch us with their creative expressions and make us feel.



Industries, a gang-intervention program located in Los Angeles. The book was written about his experiences with the program, giving a look at how full our lives could be if we could find the joy in loving others and




in being loved unconditionally through universal kinship and redemption.

Acts 11: 1-18

After Jesus' crucifixion, resurrection, and rising to heaven, Peter was "on the road" traveling - - this time in Joppa. While on the roof of Simon, a tanner, Peter had a vision. The vision ultimately instructed Peter that being a "follower of Jesus" was not limited to those of the Jewish faith. At about the same time a Roman Centurion, Cornelius of Caesarea, also had a vision. Cornelius was a God-fearing person who gave to the poor and practiced "constant prayer to God." The vision of Cornelius eventually led him to meeting with Peter, who traveled to Caesarea. Both men shared with each other the stories of their vision. It was through the experiences of Peter and Cornelius that a "bridge" was built between Jews and Gentiles; the message of Jesus was for all people of all time.

Peter's experience on the rooftop could serve as a difficult reminder that sometimes we need to have our views changed. How can the United Methodist Church welcome *all*, become more *inclusive*, and resist impulses for maintaining control of "the club?" According to Acts,



the Spirit is at work in our world blessing **all** who will receive the life-giving spirit of the resurrection.


