I just finished teaching at the Iowa Licensing School for Local Pastors. It was a great week of teaching basic skills for the beginning of ministry. It isn't the end of their education. They will



have to continue their studies at a seminary or

through the Course of Study program. We give them the essentials. They learn about pastoral care, administration, worship and preaching, and how to engage people in discipleship. This course is so important, because so many more churches are being served by those who haven't been seminary trained. To bring it closer to home, the churches in Kilduff and Reasnor will be served by one of these newly trained pastors.

As the course came to a close, the faculty evaluate the week and try to reflect and adjust what didn't work for next



year. For the most part, we thought that the week was a great success. Then we turned to the question of finances. The truth is that this school is expensive. We have to pay the facility where we hold it for the lodging and food they provide. We have to pay the

faculty something, as small as the stipend may be. So, every year, we ask how we can cut costs and still provide the same great ministry.

Sound familiar? That happens in the local church, too. That happens at St. Luke. Ministry costs money. Great ministry must be funded well in order to be great ministry. That's just how it is.

In the case of the Annual Conference, uncertainty is caus-

ing pain in the bank account. Many churches are not sure about where the denomination will find itself in the next year. This makes it hard to justify sending money to the Annual Conference. Is it going to be used well? Will it matter if



the denomination is going to die anyway? This means that apportionment giving is down and everyone is feeling the pain of that uncertainty.

This happens in the local church, too. When the uncertainty of the economy causes us to question our future comfort, it is hard to be faithful to our mission giving. Actually, faithfulness is the driver of that conversation. Is it faithful for me to be conservative and hold back my spending? Or is it faithful to give to the mission and trust that God will provide.

The answer to that is yes. Both can be faithful. If we are giving to the institution, then I believe that the faithful course is to be conservative. Institutions don't need our faithfulness.

But, if we are giving to the mission, then faithfulness is giving even when we feel the pain of uncertainty. Ministry is still needed in times of uncertainty. Ministry is still important in times of hardship. We still have a role to play in the kingdom building that God is engaged in.



I don't want you to give to the institution. I don't think that is what God is calling us to do.

I want you to give to the ministry. I want you to be engaged in the mission. I want you to support the VBS. I want you to give to flood relief. I want you to give to the campus ministries that will engage our graduates when they get to school. I want you to give to the justice ministries locally and around the world. I believe that giving to the ministry, to the mission of God in the world, is a worthwhile and faithful part of our discipleship. Engage in the faithful work of God.

works as a technical Advisor to the Africa University farm in Mutare. Jane teaches Intensive English to students from non-English countries at Africa University.


The first Sunday of each month the Sunday school offering will go toward our Sunday school administration costs, including Sunday school materials.

News from our Librarian ~ Karen Clark

This month's book is written by Lee Roorda Schott, the pastor of Women At The Well, the United 3 Methodist Church within the walls of the Iowa Women's Prison at Mitchellville. Titled Foolish Church and



subtitled Messy, Raw, Real and Making Room tells the story of Schotts's coming to know church in a whole new way once she "went to prison". She was not sent by a judge, she was sent by the bishop. She thought her role was to bring church to this place and the women within, but what she found out was that these women at this place would show her a more raw and real church than she had ever known. Schott says this is not a book about prison ministry, but rather a book about ministry, about church. I challenge you to check it out, read it, and talk to your pew neighbor about it. It could change the way we all think about church. At the very least, this book gives us plenty to think about. Like I said, check it out.


My Story



It was a rare event, but one I loved to do when I got the chance. As a kid we didn't eat out very often (and frankly my mom's cooking made that more than okay),

As I think back to those burgers, I wonder was there something special about those burgers? Or, was it the adventure and unusual event of walking the 4 blocks to purchase the



Does it really matter if those burgers were exceptional? Does it matter if it was simply the adventure and uniqueness that made it special? Not really, to me they were simply... yummy. People have a way of attempting to explain things rather than simply experiencing them.

Taking Up the Story:

Recognizing our legacy from people of faith and passing on the mantle God gives us.

Elijah was a relatively well-known prophet whose exploits are described in the books of Kings I and II. (Also, think: transfiguration: with Jesus and Moses.) Lesser known may be his successor Elisha. Elisha is honored as a prophet by Christianity, Judaism, and Islam. It was in a wilderness cave that Elijah first **learned** that Elisha was selected by God to be his successor.

Elisha, the son a of a wealthy land owner, was "ploughing with twelve yoke of oxen" when Elijah first **sighted** him. Upon seeing him, Elijah threw his "mantle" or cloak over Elisha's shoulders, as a way of "claiming" him. Elisha accepted this call and became Elijah's apprentice, or attendant, for the next seven or eight years. Little else is mentioned in the Bible of Elisha, until the time approaching Elijah being carried to heaven, and thereafter.

Elijah and Elisha experienced many adventures together, with Elisha always in the background. At the end of their seven or eight

year co-existence, the time eventually approached when Elijah knew his journey to heaven was near. One day as the two approached the Jordan River, Elijah wrapped up his cloak and touched the river with it, making a dry path for them to use in crossing.



After they had passed over, Elijah asked what were Elisha's wishes that Elijah could do for him, before he was taken. Elisha requested, "I pray thee, let a double portion of thy spirit be upon me." And it was so.

As they traveled on there appeared a chariot and horses, both of fire. Divided by these, Elijah was separated and went to heaven by a whirlwind. And Elisha saw him no more.

The **Season of the Spirit Bible Study Class** meets Sunday mornings, sandwiched between the end of the 8 am church service and the beginning of the 10:30 service. The class's emphasis is on the weekly lectionary readings. All are welcome to join in the discovery and learning!


