









Financial Update

The Financial Committee at St Luke wants to thank all of you for your generfinancial ous contributions throughout 2017. Because of your

giving, St Luke has, so far, been able to keep up with ongoing expenses.

However, our funding is becoming limited, and our budget has become tight. Soon, we will not be receiving revenue from the parsonage rental which was \$11,400 per year, so this has become a concern as well.

We mention these concerns not out of desperation, but because we think all members of St Luke want our church to remain a vibrant, outreaching church that is Christ centered.

With that in mind, we would ask that all of us prayerfully consider our financial support of St Luke United Methodist Church.

Have you ever tried to go to dinner with a group of friends? Trying to figure out where to go is usually a dance that doesn't always look



graceful. What are you hungry for? Mexi-

can? Well, no. *Italian*? Had that yesterday. A burger? Maybe. Even after years of getting to know your friends, learning their likes and dislikes, and finding a comfortable understanding of what works for your group, it can still be hard.

Now, imagine bringing in a new friend to the group. Even with just one person who hasn't learned this dance, the whole process starts again. Often, this new person feels like they don't fit in the group. This is true. Always.



This should be a temporary state. If they stick it out and learn the dance, then they can feel like they belong. Your part in this is to be gracious, to keep inviting, to let your toes be stepped on a few times (or a hundred), and to keep insisting that they dance with you.

This is essential for us to remember whenever new people come to the church. It is hard for people to break in to the tight knit community of a church. This is true regardless of how open, welcoming, and friendly a church is. No matter how much you try to include someone, they will feel like they don't fit until they learn the dance-until they learn the vernacular, until they learn the customs that you all take for granted.

Please remember this for the next few months. I, and my family, are excited to be here. We have been preparing to come for months. We are looking forward to becoming Newtonians (Newtonites?). See, we don't even know what you all call yourselves.

We are excited to be here. But we will make mistakes. We will step on toes. We won't do it intentionally, but we don't yet know your dance. We want to learn your dance. We hope you want to teach us.

As we learn, here's a few things you can do to help us. Invite us. Invite us to dinner, at your house or your favorite place. Invite us to social events. Invite us. Keep inviting us, even



if we say no the first time. Wendy and I have a real desire to share in your lives, even as our family will be scheduled by our kids' activities. We will say yes whenever we can.

Please share things about the life and customs of St. Luke. Please don't assume we know something, even if it is obvious to you. Help us to learn the dance.

And please be willing to dance with us. As outsiders, we will have a different perspective of the things you take for granted. I will likely ask why you do things the

way you do. Sometimes it will be because I think it is strange, but more often, I will ask simply to understand. Sometimes it will be to help you understand why you do the things you have always done.

These next few months can be a refresher course for all of us. It can remind us how to welcome new people to St. Luke. I certainly hope that the Jennings family

won't be the only new people God brings to St. Luke. So these months can remind us how to be people of grace-filled hospitality. It can help us to be open to new ideas, new ways of serving God, and new ways to be community together.



A dance takes a partner or a troupe. It takes coordinated movement. It takes timing. And it takes grace. Can we covenant together to offer grace first, teaching second, and growth together as we learn each other's favorite dance?



Another recent best seller, new to our little library in the corner is *Option B* by Sheryl Sandberg and Adam Grant. After her husband's sudden death Sandberg wondered if she or her children would ever feel joy again.



Her friend Adam Grant a psychologist taught her some skills people can take to recover from life's tragedies. We are not born with a fixed amount of resilience, but it is something everyone can develop. This book combines Sheryl's personal insights with Adam's research on finding strength in the face of adversity. *Option B* goes beyond Sheryl's loss to explore how a broad range of people have overcome all sorts of hardships and losses. The stories in this book reveal the capacity of the human spirit to persevere and rediscover joy. Resilience comes from deep within us and from support outside us. Even after the most devastating events, it is possible to grow by finding deeper meaning and gaining greater gratitude in our lives. The LORD your God wins victory after victory and is always with you. He celebrates and sings because of you, and he will refresh your life with his love." (Zephaniah 3:17 cev)


God has also given each of us different gifts to use. (Romans 12:6a cev)

Being open to the mystery of God's leading and presence in our times of vulnerability. Genesis 28:10-19a

Isaac and Rebekah had two sons, Esau and Jacob (Israel). One day a famished firstborn Esau traded his birthright (the right to be recognized as firstborn) with Jacob for a bowl of stew. For this lentil stew Esau gave up one half his inheritance (1/3 of Isaac's estate). Much later Jacob tricked his father Isaac into granting Isaac's blessing onto Jacob, when (blind) Isaac had thought he was blessing Esau. (Who was blessed would become the next head of the extended family when Isaac died.) An angry Esau vowed to kill Jacob, so Rebekah encouraged him to flee a great distance to live with Laban, his uncle. Jacob was the son who was deceptive, devious, and clev-

The transformation of Jacob begins on the road, at Luz. That night Jacob experienced a dream wherein he was called to raise himself heavenward. Jacob visualized a ladder, or stairway, with angels ascending and descending it. At the top stood the Lord who revealed to Jacob that all the world would be blessed through Jacob's descend-

When Jacob awoke from his dreaming sleep, he was afraid and

declared "... This is none other than the house of God; this is the gate of heaven." Jacob took the stone, on which he had previously placed his head as he slept, set it up as a pillar and poured oil on top of it. Jacob renamed that place Bethel which means House of God.
