We recently adopted a Discipleship Pathway at St. Luke. This is the intentional path that we follow as disciples to more fully **CONNECT**




to God and to each other, to GROW in

our faith, and to SERVE God in the church and the world, to do our part in building the kingdom that we ask to have come in the Lord's Prayer.

For the next three months, I will say some more about each of these areas of focus. This month, we will start with CONNECT.

God designed us to be social creatures. We need each other. We know that isolation is detrimental to our mental health, which is seen in those that have been cut-off from social interaction. This is demonstrated in movies, such as Passengers and Castaway. Without interaction, we become something other than human.



So, it makes sense that one of the ways that we CON-**NECT** with God is through each other. The ancient Jews felt this connection through their tribe, which also manifested itself in a connection to their ancestors. This all stemmed from the covenant that God made with them to be God's people. This connection through covenant was at the heart of their identity as a people.

We see that in our own lives. We identify through our connections. We are Iowans. We are Christians. We are United Methodists. We are Cardinals. And these things are sometimes deeply embedded in us. They help us to know who is with us, who is on our side.

As those who are **CONNECT**ed to St. Luke, we have made a commitment to each other. It came in our membership vows, when we said that we would support each other in our walk with God and in our lives in the community. By intention, we are better together than we are by ourselves.

So, how are you CON-**NECTing** with each other? Are you involved with your church family at any time other than Sunday morning? Do you get together with CHURCH (&) HOME people from church? Do you



CONNECT on Facebook? Do you meet downtown? Do you gather for Bible Study or fellowship?

How can you take a step along the discipleship pathway in the area of **CONNECT?** How can you encourage others in their faith journey? How can you deepen a relationship with someone around your connection with God?

Over the next month, do something to make an inten-

tional CONNECTion. Invite someone over. Start a dialogue. Be bold and talk to someone in the community about getting **CONNECT**ed at St. Luke.

As we do that, our relationship with God will become deeper and more valuable to us. Continue on the journey together.

The first Sunday of each month the Sunday school offering will go toward our Sunday school administration costs, including Sunday school materials.



give our school year teachers a break, volunteers are asked to sign-up to teach for a Sunday or two during the summer.


There is a sign-up sheet on the Servants Counter for volunteers to choose the Sunday they would like to teach. If you have


As the song says, "It only takes a spark to get a fire going." So let's all BE that Spark! Spread Gods Love!

Unexpected Prophets: 2 Kings 5: 1-14

Opening ourselves to unexpected opportunities for healing witness.

The king of Aram (modern Syria), had a commander named Naaman. Naaman was a well-reputed soldier with a problem: he had a skin disease, called leprosy. A captured Israeli slave girl told Naaman's wife that her husband should visit a prophet in Samaria (Israel) and have his disease "cured." Naaman asked his king permission to make the journey; the king facilitated the undertaking by giving Naaman a hand-written note asking for Naaman's healing. The king sent with him gold, silver, and valuable garments. These, Naaman was to present to the king of Israel. Why do you suppose Naaman's king directed him to approach the Israeli *king* for healing, instead of a **prophet**, as Naaman was originally advised?

The king of Israel was surprised that a person (Naaman) would ask *him* to heal his leprosy: "Am I God? Can I kill and bring back to life?"

Elisha, the man of God (prophet) sent word for his Israeli king to send Naaman to him. When Naaman approached the doorway of Elisha's house, a messenger conveyed to Naaman that he should wash himself seven times in the Jordan... "and you shall be clean."



At first Naaman felt insulted that Elisha did not directly meet with him. And why, the Jordan? Why not rivers in his home country? It took Naaman's servants to reason with him-what did it matter what he was told to do? Wouldn't he want to do it, if it would heal him? And heal him, it did!

There is *much* more to this very interesting story, than (just) presented here... Where would this story be without its servants?

The Seasons of the Spirit Bible Study Class meets Sunday mornings, sandwiched between the end of the 8 a.m. church service and the beginning of the 10:30 service. The class's emphasis is on the weekly lectionary readings. **All** are welcome to join in the discovery and learning!

2019 Iowa Annual Conference

Annual Conference was held this year June 8-11 with clergy and laity sessions on Friday evening, June 7th. The theme this year was Creating Difference Makers – In Ministry with the Poor.

The Laity session on Friday Night was opened by Iowa Conference Lay Leader Margaret Borgen, telling attendees she hoped they left the session inspired and with "new tools in their tool box."

Bishop Laurie Haller followed with an address to the Laity before moving on to the Clergy session. She acknowledged that it was somewhat of a hard time in the UMC right now. But went on to say, "Our theological task is to love God and love our neighbor."

The evening closed with mini-workshops for the Laity. These workshops were:

- Connecting Your Church to the World; Making Missions Exciting in the Local Church!
- Disaster Preparedness and Response
- From Entertaining to Empowering Youth
- How Exposure to Nature Will Change Your Life; Churches and Camps Partnering

I just found out this year that the Laity session is open to all lay people of the Iowa Annual Conference.

The four days of the conference included many special services including the Episcopal address where Bishop Laurie continued with the conference theme, stating, "Remember, you are poor." "You do not have the resources to save yourself, fix your problems, or change the world – only God does."

Along with the services, there was much praise and singing. And there was all of the legislation that needed to be taken care of and electing delegates and alternates to the General and Jurisdictional conferences next year. Pastor Chad was elected as a delegate on the first ballot.

The legislation actually went pretty smoothly, although we did at one point have a discussion about whether climate change was real or not. The most disappointing legislation for me was the decision to close Pictured Rocks camp and sell it to Camp Courageous after this camping season.

Other legislation included resolutions in response to the Special conference which was held back in February. The conference budget and some shortfalls in it were also discussed and voted on. If anyone would like a more in depth look at all of the legislation, please go to the conference website www.iaumc.org/ac2019. You will also be able to find everything else that happened at Annual Conference including many inspiring messages by several of

our speakers and pastors for the services.

It also gave me a sense of pride to see 3 St. Luke youth (Nathan and Abby Jennings, Jacob Murphy) serving as Diakonos (pages) during conference. They were very busy doing a lot of the work necessary to make for a successful conference. And the Diakonos entertaining and funny skit was a huge hit once again this year.

I also want to thank St. Luke for the opportunity to be your delegate again this year. It is something I look forward to and look at it as a great learning and uplifting experience.
