

As we start a new era at St Luke, it is important that we continue our goal of meeting our financial responsibilities. Thanks to your gracious and prayerful giving, we have been able to have our 2017 apportionments paid up to date. It is always good when we can report positive news from the Finance Committee.

So, from the Finance Committee, we say a big, Thank You!

The future of St Luke United Methodist is bright. Your continued attendance and financial support are greatly appreciated.

These offerings have been received:

July 2: \$4417 including \$140-Building Fund; \$21-Sunday School Supplies; \$36-Disaster Relief.

July 9: \$2731 including \$115-Building Fund; \$100-Apportionments; \$10-Kies Missionaries.

July 16: \$1756-including \$96-Building Fund; \$11-Kies Missionaries; \$150-Apportionments.




My Story

Jealousy

Imagining how God might be working in our lives when all seems lost: Genesis 37:1-4, 12-28

Jacob, grandson of Abraham, had twelve sons who would eventually become the leaders of Israel's 12 tribes. Of those twelve sons, two, Joseph and Benjamin, were mothered by Rachel, Jacob's first "love." When Joseph was a shepherd at age 17, he decided to report back to his father about the things that his older half-brothers were doing wrong. Jacob (also known as Israel) had a special love for Joseph, because Joseph was born when he was elderly. Israel presented Joseph with a colorful long-sleeved robe. The gift of this special coat was a visual reminder to Joseph's older brothers that their father loved him more than the rest, and their resentment and jealousy of Joseph grew.

Some time later Israel asked Joseph to travel to where his older brothers should have been located, pasturing their father's flocks: "...make sure the flocks are well. When you get back, give me a report." Joseph eventually came upon his brothers and the sheep in Dothan. Seeing him approaching, most of his brothers conspired to kill Joseph and throw his body into one of the pits. Reuben, the oldest, however, proposed not killing Joseph, but tossing him into a pit, without "laying a hand on him." (Reuben's plan was to secretly come back later, rescue Joseph, and take him home to their father, before any more harm came to him.)

The brothers agreed to the amended plan, ripped off Joseph's robe, and threw him into an empty cistern. Shortly after that a caravan approached; they were on their way to Egypt. Judah then proposed selling Joseph, as a means of "getting rid" of



him: "We won't have to lay a hand on him then. He is, after all, our brother, our own flesh and blood." All of the brothers agreed, and Joseph was sold for about eight ounces of silver.

August is Ingathering School Kits Time

It's that time again. Time to collect supplies for school kits. Time to make bags for school kits.

We invite you to purchase supplies and bring them into the church. You don't even have to put them in a bag, we'll do that for you. There is a table near Pastor's office in the Narthex with a box for supplies.



Once we have some supplies on hand, the counting and assembling will begin. If we have partial kits, a note will be added with what is needed to complete this kit.


The Ingathering book notes: "School kits provide tools for education, which changes lives. In countries where children don't have books, school supplies or classrooms, a school kit may be their only educational resource."

A school kit includes:

- 3 spiral notebooks (8 ½ x 11 wide rule) Total of 210-250 sheets of paper
- 1 -30 cm metric ruler
- 1 box of 24 crayons (Only 24)
- 1 2 ½ inch eraser
- 1 blunt end scissors (metal blades)
- 1 hand pencil sharpener (no 1-inch)
- 6 unsharpened pencils with erasers

School bags can be made of sturdy cloth – 14 inch wide x 16 inch long (finished size) with 1 inch x 19 inch finished size handles. (It is very important that the items match the above descriptions. Also, no slogans or flags.)

If you are interested in making school bags, instructions can be found on the table by Pastor Chad's office or online at: www.midwestmissiondc.org. A school bag sewing day will be held at St Luke in the fall.



Missions... And you...

St Luke has always been a good at giving to missions. We have been a 3rd Mile rainbow covenant church for years. What is that, you ask? That means 1) We pay our apportionments in full - giving and sharing in connec-

tion with other churches around the world. 2) We give to a broad range of mission opportunities including: World (Red band) \$1 per member, US National (Orange band) \$1 per member, UMCOR offerings (Yellow band) \$1 per member, World Hunger & Poverty (Green band) \$6 per member, State of Iowa



(blue band) \$1 per member, Parish Development (Indigo band) \$1 per member, and Special Offerings (purple band) \$1 per member. 3)The third mile of the covenant is made up of Missionary & Covenant Relationships (\$2 per member) and Local & Institutional giving (\$1 per member).

The NOW committee tries really hard to spread out the mission opportunities throughout the year. We offer giving opportunities each month. We do not expect you to give to every opportunity offered but we hope you will give to those that touch your heart. If a mission doesn't speak to your interests, it will reach and speak to someone else. All we are really asking is that you prayerfully consider the options presented. God Bless.

The Iowa Correctional Institution for Women receives an average of 60-80 new female prisoners every month. As you can imagine, most of them are struggling to come to grips with her new circumstances, and trying to understand how she can begin to turn her life around. However, for most of the women new to ICIW, a Bible isn't among their scant possessions.
