




VBS 2019

Glory to God, who is able to do far beyond all that we could ask or imagine by His power at work within us! Ephesians 3:20




















Welcome to August. The summer is going way too fast. It is already time to prepare ourselves for the new school year and all the things that



ramp up in the church in the Fall.

Now, even if you aren't in school, or have school aged children, our lives are scheduled around the school schedule. When school starts, we get excited about Fall sports. We will soon see Cross Country runners around town. We will soon hear the marching band practicing for half-time shows.

Whether we are in school, or not, have kids or grandkids in school, or not, we should always be students of life. We should always be learning new things, both about the world and about ourselves. This brings us to the next installment of our series on the Discipleship Pathway.



The Discipleship Pathway at St. Luke is summed up by the words CONNECT. GROW. SERVE. This is the intentional path that we follow as disciples to more fully **CONNECT** to God and to each other, to **GROW** in our faith, and to SERVE God in the church and the world, to do our part in building the kingdom that we ask to have come in the Lord's Prayer.

Albert Einstein said, "Once you stop learning, you start dying." Cognitive specialists tell us that engaging the mind in learning will help slow down memory loss. My grandmother had Alzheimer's, and her doctors believe that the onset of it was slowed because she did a crossword puzzle. The puzzle engaged her mind, but she would also learn about things she didn't know by researching the words she didn't know in the puzzle.

Learning is a vital part of our life both inside and outside the church. The only way that we can keep our mind

sharp and our spirits growing is to engage in intentional learning about God and the way that God works in our world. There are several opportunities to engage in GROWth through learning.



You may engage in learning outside the church. Maybe you want to learn about what is going on in the world with climate change. Reading, listening to podcasts, watching programs about it, all of these things will help you learn about climate change. Perhaps your exploration of this topic will lead you to an author that approaches the subject from a faith perspective. Including God in this conversation may open up the ways in which your faith may affect how you approach this issue.

Perhaps you will decide that the church should learn something about this. Either through one of the adult Sunday School classes, or through a short term small group study, we can explore this topic together, learning from an author and from each other. Ouite often, we learn so much more in the engagement of others in the things we are passionate about.

So, ministries of GROW include our own devotional time, Sunday School classes, small group studies, and UMW lessons. It also includes the portion of Worship where the word is read and expanded on in the sermon. But it may also happen through lectures, TED talks, and conversations at the library or other churches.

As we get closer to the start of school, ask yourself how you are still learning about your faith. If you aren't doing anything, look for opportunities to GROW in your discipleship and to keep living as a Christian.



Faith is... HEBREWS 11:1-3, 8-16

Trusting God's promises as we explore individual and corporate faith

The New Testament book of Hebrews is thought to possibly have been written in approximately 63 or 64, before the destruction of the temple, by Barnabas (a missionary who traveled with Paul), Apollos (a colleague of Paul), or Priscilla, Barnabas' teacher.

A main theme of Hebrews is <u>faith</u> in what we do not see. Examples in chapter 11 illustrate various Old Testament experiences of characters "proceeding on," with their lives in the face of adversities; the one thing which gave them strength was their *faith* in the promises of God. Abel's gift to God, Abel's believing *faith*, was what made the difference. Noah built a ship in the middle

of dry land. Abraham and Sarah, a childless couple in their 70s, were foretold they would participate in the growing of "great nation which would arise." Though they had security in possessions and land, they set off in faith. By faith Moses refused



the privileges of the Egyptian royal house.

"...Each one of these people of faith died not yet having in hand what was promised, but still believing. How did they do it? They saw it way off in the distance, waved their greeting and accepted the fact that they were **transients** in this world. People who live this way make it plain that they are looking for their true home..."

It was Paul Tillich who declared "faith reveals what *really* matters to us," what we value most deeply. This can be seen in those people who challenge the status quo and strive to take the "long view" in life.

The Seasons of the Spirit Bible Study Class meets Sunday mornings, sandwiched between the end of the 8 a.m. church service and the beginning of the 10:30 service. The class's emphasis is on the weekly lectionary readings. **All** are welcome to join in the discovery and learning!

Our "calling," Frederick Buechner said, is "where [our] deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet."

But is there a GPS for *vocation?* It's not as detailed or predictive as we'd like. It doesn't name our destination at the outset, and it offers general instructions rather than specific directions. And we may end up "recalculating" our life route more often than our vehicle GPS recalculates our vacation route.

Even so, we travel in safety. This "GPS" might stand for God's Peace and Strength, or Gospel Promises Sustain, God Provides Salvation or Go! Proclaim! Serve! The GPS guiding our vocation speaks to us through Scripture, worship, trusted Christian friends, life events and the silence of our heart. Listening, we hear our Guide's calm voice and continue on vocation.
