

Financial Update

The Finance Committee, would like to thank the congregation for their faithful giving to St. Luke UMC. With your contributions, we

have been able to keep up with our day to day expenses. However, one area that needs our attention is our apportionment contributions. Our apportionment goal for 2018 is just over \$25,000. With four months to go in this budget year, we still need approximately \$16,000, or \$4,000 a month, to reach our goal.

Apportionments are important to the United Methodist Church. One of the main items that apportionment monies goes to is World Service. World Service does such things making evangelism stronger, helps stimulate church growth, and expands existing Bible studies. These efforts go on world wide.

Back to school. If you have kids or grandkids, then this marks the beginning of something. It is a time when the kids get back to their routine



(and so do the parents, with a sigh of relief). But it is also a time of new beginnings. The students get to be in the next grade up, which brings a lot of excitement, and maybe a touch of apprehension. I get it. There are many new possibilities with a new grade. But, there are also a lot of new things. New things can be good, or they can be bad, but they are always unknown.

That same thing can happen in other areas of our lives. It seems like life is full of change. Some of it is good. Some is not so good. In any case, change can be difficult, especially if it is change that we weren't anticipating or welcoming.



For that reason, change is something that we often resist in certain places in our lives. In my experience, church is one of the places that we try to limit the amount of change we experience. And yet, no matter how hard we resist, change happens.

A year ago, that change came in the form of a new pastor. And even though it was welcomed by some, it was still a major change and it took some time to adjust to it. Here we are, a year later, and that change almost seems normal.

Change is still coming. It is coming in the things we see and the things we don't. We can see the new roof, the new gutters (going up today), and the other things that the building project includes. We can see the change that comes with new members joining, though their influence on this community may not be seen at first.

Change can be hard, but over time, it often turns out that the change is not that bad, or even that much of a change. In my first parish, I started out by wearing dress pants, shirt, and tie. Within a couple of months, I stopped wearing the tie. As I did this, I told people that I wanted anyone new coming to the church to feel comfortable in whatever they were wearing, so I was going to dress more casually to help them feel welcome. I heard some grumbling at first. People wanted me to dress up more.



Then a few years later, I was in a Sunday School class with several men. One of them started to reminisce. "Do you remember when we used to dress in suits for Sunday morning? I sure am glad we don't do that anymore." Another guy asked, "Do you remember how long ago that was?" "Oh, 15 years ago." I thought to myself, *that was only 3 years ago.*

Change isn't always bad. It often comes with things that we wouldn't want to live without once we get used

to it. That is an important thing for us to remember whenever we get nervous about a change in our lives.

In all of that, God is constant. God is always there, always present, always loving us, always full of grace. God is...and that never changes.

Embrace change, and it will be easier to adjust to whatever comes, but know that God's love for you will never change.

My Story

It was raining, so recess was indoors that afternoon. We stayed in our third grade classroom, where we played games, read books and giggled. Someone pulled an old science book off the shelf and we found it hilarious that the book said, "And someday, we may even put a man on the moon." We thought that was so funny because none of us remembered a time when humans had NOT been on the moon. We were 3-years-old when the first moon landing happened, so to us, it had always been that way.



Our world is constantly changing and evolving. What used to be science fiction... is now science fact. And what we now know to be only a dream, will someday be reality. The incomprehensible vision now... will become clearer in hindsight.

When we read the Bible today, we can see the prophets are foretelling the life, mission and salvation of Jesus. Micah 5:2 *"But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel, whose origin is from of old, from ancient days."* OR

Isaiah 53:5 *"But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed."*

We can also look at the things Jesus tells his disciples or the Jewish leaders and with hindsight we see he is telling them about his death and resurrection. Matthew 17:22-23 *"As they were gathering in Galilee, Jesus said to them, 'The Son of Man is going to be betrayed into human hands, and they will kill him, and on the third day he will be raised.'" And they were greatly distressed."* OR John 2:19 *"Jesus answered them, 'Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up.'"*

The disciples did not completely understand everything Jesus told them... until after the resurrection. After the resurrection, what were a confusing and incomprehensible statements, suddenly made sense to them. It became their job, and our job to share the story... to tell others. To go make disciples and to share the reality of God's love with the world.

Humanity Sunday

Reflecting on the relationship between God, humans, and the rest of creation:
Genesis 1:26-28

"I make you trustees of My estate, so care for My creation..."
Genesis 1:28b.

The three verse Genesis passage begins with God creating wild animals, domesticated animals of all sizes, small creeping creatures, each able to reproduce its own kind. *"God saw that His new creation was beautiful and good. And God paused."*

Next up was a new creation: humanity. Humans are the only creatures described as being made in God's image. We are asked to mirror to the world and take care of it, as God takes care of us. Some believe we are asked to use our "authority" over all other creatures to relate to the world as God would, facilitating the world reaching full potential without irreparable harm. The Genesis account places a responsibility on humans to model justice and a stewardship of the earth.

September 9th, Humanity Sunday, offers the opportunity to see ourselves as only one small part of **creation**. Humans can see themselves as interdependent with God's creation.

Mobility Worldwide, formerly called PET, in Leighton, Iowa is interested in having St. Luke come and volunteer. This has been an outreach we have been doing for about 3 years. On Friday, September 28, meet at St Luke to carpool to Leighton at 8 am. Wear old clothes and bring a sack lunch. We arrive about 9 AM and stay until approximately 3 PM. There are jobs for those who can assemble carts, paint cart components or sew the fabric seat covers.



The shop in Leighton makes 11 carts per week and has built 2600 carts since 2011. These carts provide mobility, occupation, community, education and dignity.

- 1 new hand towel (15"x25" up to 17"x27")
- 1 new washcloth
- 1 bath-sized bar of soap in wrapper (3 oz. or larger) No Ivory or Jergens
- 1 large, sturdy comb (longer than 6 inches)
- 1 new toothbrush in original sealed wrapper, not child-sized
- 6 band aids (3/4"-1")
- 1 metal nail file or fingernail clipper (no emery boards or toenail clippers)

Kits or kit items can be placed in the Ingathering basket on the Mission table.




SHARE Food Program
