Many times as Christians, we can find ourselves thinking it is nothing out of the ordinary to know that Jesus Christ died on a cross and rose from the grave to conquer sin and death. We know this by faith. We've heard it over and over. We sometimes take it for granted.

But it was and it is a truly extraordinary thing. He died for ME and for YOU over 2000 years ago. HE knew us by name,

# Following the Call

Matthew 4:12-23


Participating in the call to follow Jesus

Not long after Jesus was baptized by his relative, John the Baptizer, John was beheaded by Herod Antipas. Likely in response to John's murder, Jesus went back to Galilee, from Nazareth to Capernaum, a town by the sea. Traveling and preaching, as an itinerant, Jesus's message was *Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand*, encouraging people to turn away from sin and toward God.

Jesus was in need of friends and followers who would help Him carry out the mission of sharing His message. The first followers were called <u>disciples</u>, which means <u>apprentices</u>.

The first two disciples Jesus "recruited" were Si-

mon, also called Peter, and Andrew, fishermen. Come, follow me, and I will make you fishers of men. Next, James and John, brothers, were in a boat with their father, Zebedee, and immediately they left their boat and their father to follow Jesus. These



ordinary individuals left their families, comfort of their homes, and assured livelihoods. They were inspired!

From there Jesus continued to ask people to repent, healed the sick, and proclaimed the kingdom of God.

The Seasons of the Spirit Bible Study Class meets Sunday mornings, after the 9:30 church service. To honor and respect all present we are immunized. The class's emphasis is on the weekly lectionary readings. Various Bibles' presentations of the same passage are compared and discussed, and sometimes we come up with our own questions which we had never before considered. Below are each week's main passages.

Human Relations Day is an opportunity for United Methodists to share in seeking justice for our neighbors.




On this day, congregations are given the unique opportunity to join with individuals, groups, businesses, community organizations and residents to heal the wounds of social inequality. The special offering sup-

## **Adult-2 Sunday School Class**

The Adult 2 Sunday School class is reading and discussing the book *Barking to the Choir: The Power of Radical Kinship* by Gregory Boyle. If you are familiar with *Tattoos on the Heart* or *The Whole Language*, you will enjoy reading Gregory Boyle's 2nd book in this series. In a nation deeply divided and plagued by poverty and violence, *Barking to the Choir* offers a snapshot into



the challenges and joys of life on the margins. Sergio, arrested at age nine, in a gang by age twelve, and serving time shortly thereafter, now works with the substance-abuse team at Homeboy to help others find sobriety. Jamal, abandoned by his family when he tried to attend school at age seven, gradually finds forgiveness for his schizophrenic mother. New father Cuco, who never knew his

own dad, thinks of a daily adventure on which to take his four-year-old son. These former gang members uplift the soul and reveal how bright life can be when filled with unconditional love and kindness.

If you are looking for a class with variety and topical studies, this would be a good class for you. We read the book together, so there is no "homework". There is always room for more to join the conversation. We meet in Room 5 in the education wing right after Worship.

•Legal assistance, counseling, and social support for those who have lost their homes, belongings, and livelihoods:




- •Winterization and repairs at shelters, as well as construction on longer-term lodging for those displaced by the war;

#### Meet Bishop Kennetha Bigham-Tsai

Bishop Kennetha Bigham-Tsai has been assigned as the resident bishop for the Iowa Area, effective Jan. 1, 2023. She was elected to the episcopacy at the 2022 North Central Jurisdictional Conference. Before her election, she served as the chief connectional ministries officer of the Connectional Table for the United Methodist Church since 2018.

Bishop Bigham-Tsai, has served as a district superintendent in the Michigan Annual Conference and as a local church pastor in Kalamazoo and East Lansing, Michigan.

Bigham-Tsai said of her vision of the church: "I envision a United Methodist Church that fully claims its identity as a church that centers grace. This is a church that is open and inclusive of all people. It is a church that addresses racism in the church and in society and actively

seeks reconciliation, healing, and justice for its LGBTQIA+ children. Such a church approaches ministry with an outwardfacing and invitational love." She describes her leadership as a "relational, collaborative, and innovative leader who makes my own physical, emotional, and spiritual health a priority. I am a visionary



who is mission-directed and willing to experiment. I believe in surrounding myself with strong leaders, then equipping and allowing them to lead. I enjoy leading with people who are open to the creative movement of the Spirit, and I enjoy mentoring and developing new leaders."

Bishop Bigham-Tsai is married to Kee Tsai. They have two children, Keeton and Kandem Bigham-Tsai, and a German Shepherd, Kylo.

Bishop Kennetha Bigham-Tsai said she feels "elated, deeply humbled and a little bit emotional" after being elected and assigned to Iowa. She asks that the people of Iowa would pray that her family would be well in their transition to Iowa, that God would surprise them and delight them in ways that they can't yet imagine, and in her leadership that she will be able to listen closely, not just to the words, but to what is underneath the words.






